Read! Read! Read!

With our Reading Supports Workshop coming up on April 19th, this seemed like a good time to share VDOE's literacy suggestions. Kindergarten - Grade 2

- Take a walk and look for things that begin with each letter of the alphabet.
- Choose a favorite story and perform it as a play for someone in your house.
- Read! Read! Read!

Grades 3-5

- Dinner conversations: Talk with students about what they are reading during dinnertime. Ask questions such as; What is the book about? Who is the main character? Where is the book set? How do you know? What have you found interesting so far?
- Pick a favorite character from a story you are reading or have read. Create a collage about that character.
- Read! Read! Read!

Grades 6-8

- Choose an object or place in your house. Write a description of the object or place using as many adjectives and details as possible, but do not say what the object or place is. Give your description to someone in your house and have them try to draw the object or place based on your description.
- Create a greeting card with a poem; add a picture to go with the poem. Send it to a neighbor!
- Read! Read! Read!

Grades 9-12

- Find an article in a magazine or newspaper. Cut out or black out different words in the article. See if you can use your context clues to determine the missing words.
- Choose a scene from a book you're reading or have read. Create a script for a newscast to deliver including the main ideas and highlights from the event. Record yourself delivering the breaking news.
- Create a Top 5 list for anything you're interested in. For each, write an explanation for why each choice is in each spot, being sure to provide some evidence.
- Read! Read! Read!



Resource Spotlight



Youth MOVE (Motivating Others through Voices of Experience) is a platform for young people to share their stories and inspire others. YMV is Virginia's Statewide Youth Network and voice for young people with systems experience. In addition to the mental health system, YMV is open to youth and young adults (ages 14-29) who have experience in the child welfare, education, or juvenile justice systems, including foster care and substance use/recovery services.

YMV is governed by a Youth Advisory Board, comprised of 15 young people from around the state who have lived experience or a connection to mental health. These individuals were recruited because of their experience with various systems and insight based on personal and/or family experience. Board members meet quarterly and are routinely included in discussions about mental health policy and practice to stay informed on current activity across the state.


