Welcome Back!

Over the next few weeks, our students will be returning to school. For families of children with challenges, this time of year comes with lots of strong feelings. We are anxious our child will feel overwhelmed by the new environment. We are hopeful they will make new, supportive friends. We are worried they may need extra supports. We are excited to have them learning so many new things. We are happy they are returning to a structured environment. We are scared they might be bullied for being different. We may even be relieved to know there will be other adults supporting them and giving us a break. Whatever you are feeling, you are not alone!

To make the return to school easier for our kiddos (and us!), there are some simple steps we can take before classes begin. Walk to the bus stop with your kids and talk about waiting in line, staying seated, and using an "indoor voice." Walk around the outside of the school and see where the buses will line up each day. Visit the playground or athletic fields so it will all feel familiar. Contact your child's teacher(s) to introduce yourself and let them know you value them as a member of your child's support team.

If your student is especially anxious about the first day, request a private tour of the school when everything is still quiet. If possible, meet the teacher(s) so your child will recognize them on the very first day. You may even ask to take a photo of your student with the teacher so your child can look at it again before school starts. Help your child prepare some get-to-know-you questions and comments. For my son, knowing which teachers had pets and which ones loved math was the key to making a connection. Asking about pets and other favorite topics can help the student see the teacher as a real person who has a life outside the classroom, too. The student can also share their special interests with the teacher as a way to connect.

Virginia Literacy Act

(in case you missed it)

Beginning in the 2024-2025 school year:

Every student in kindergarten to grade three will receive core literacy instruction based on scientifically based reading research and evidence-based literacy instruction, as defined in the VLA. Students will also receive evidence-based instruction and intervention, as outlined in an individualized student reading plan, if they do not meet literacy benchmarks.

Every family will have access to online resources to support literacy development at home and will be able to participate in the development of their child's student reading plan, if their child does not meet literacy benchmarks.

Every teacher will use evidence-based literacy curriculum, assess student learning using approved literacy screeners, use student-level data to inform instruction and intervention, and participate in pre-service preparation or training on evidence-based literacy instruction.

Every reading specialist, in consultation with classroom teachers, will coordinate and oversee intervention for students not meeting literacy benchmarks, and will develop and monitor student progress on student reading plans, working closely with families and teachers.

Every division will develop a literacy plan, ensure the use of evidence-based literacy curriculum, staff enough reading specialists to support intervention needs, and provide professional development to support teachers, reading specialists, and principals. https://www.doe.virginia.gov/teaching-learning-assessment/k-12-standards-instruction/english-reading-literacy/virginia-literacy-act

Help Wanted: PRC Intern*

The Parent Resource Center Intern will work at the office in Ivy Creek School to assist the Coordinator with the planning and presentation of educational events for families of students in special education, as well as gathering and disseminating information on local resources to support all areas of special education. The intern will receive training on multiple aspects of special education services in the Piedmont Regional Education Program service area, to include the school divisions of Albemarle County, Charlottesville City, Fluvanna County, Greene County, Louisa County, Madison County, Nelson County, and Orange County.

*This is a contract position from September 2023 through April 2024 (excluding December) with some flexibility. The PRC intern will be allotted a monthly stipend of \$700 based on an average of 10-12 hours per week. A \$100 completion bonus is payable if the intern retains the position for a minimum of 30 weeks. No work hours are expected for Thanksgiving week and the first week of April. 


The Problem with Problems
